

This year, I hadn't planned on attending the IIBEC conference in Orlando. After all, I had been fortunate enough to attend the convention in Phoenix in 2024, thanks to my employer, Rimkus. the <u>IIBEC Code of Ethics</u>, and earning a satisfactory score on an online examination. A REWO is an impartial on-site inspector for the design team. The observer's vigilance helps keep construction on track and on budget.

REWOs act with full authority to observe all construction materials, equipment, and supplies for quality and compliance with the design team's intent. Congratulations Stefan!

BUILDING ENCLOSURE

Title: The Butterfly

Project Description and Background:

High-performance all-glass enclosures are familiar, indoor pools are ubiquitous, but all-glass point-supported pool facades supported on iconic precast structure without visible HVAC ducting are unthinkable.

The lessons learned and solutions developed from this project have led to several rules of thumb that have governed modern natatorium design. The Butterfly project is a valuable resource to professionals looking to design for high-humidity occupancies with large glazing ratios.

As the building enclosure consultant on The Butterfly pool enclosure design, we used advanced computational fluid dynamics (CFD) modelling integrated with building enclosure design to mitigate the risk of condensation and comfort issues. Other aspects of the design include point-supported glazing, precast structural elements, and concealed HVAC systems of a high-performance natatorium enclosure.

Project Scope: RDH was used as the building enclosure professional to review the Butterfly high-rise, heritage building retained adjacent to the new building, and to provide enclosure, structural facade engineering services for the pool enclosure.

Project Solution: Investigating condensation and constructability issues within the pool room led to unique membrane detailing, structural modifications, and HVAC solutions.

Project Value: Being able to use building science principles to make the architect's vision a reality was possible with enclosure consulting involvement early in the design process. Working closely with the project team during construction to resolve a variety of structural, mechanical, and enclosure issues was possible because of our team's ability to recognize how building science principles can make the pool enclosure work as originally designed.

Title: The High Museum of Art: Wieland Pavilion and Anne Cox Chambers Wing Roof Replacement

Project Description and Background: The Wieland Pavilion and Anne Cox Chambers Wing are part of a 177,000-square-foot expansion of the Robert W. Woodruff Arts Center Inc.'s High Museum of Art, and were completed in 2005. Designed by renowned Italian architect Renzo Piano, in collaboration with Atlanta based Lord, Aeck, and Sargent Architects, the expansion features three buildings clad in white aluminum wall panels and low-slope roof areas containing 1,000 custom tubular skylights fitted with solar deflecting light sails that are intended to provide the museum with uniform diffused interior

natural lighting conditions. The Wieland Pavilion contains four levels with 800 skylights, and the Anne Cox Chambers Wing contains three levels with 200 skylights. Both wings function primarily as art galleries, displaying a portion of the High's permanent collection, and rotating special exhibitions.

Merik Inc. was hired by the owner to serve initially as a roof consultant to determine the cause of and develop repair recommendations for a series of persistent leaks that had occurred within the building for years. Numerous investigative techniques were used, in

conjunction with other professionals, and it was ultimately determined that the existing original roof systems had completely failed and could not be effectively repaired. Over the course of the project, Merik's role as consultant morphed into that of roof system designer, construction contract administrator, and full-time quality assurance construction observer for various new custom roof solutions.

Project Scope: The skylight roofs consist of low slope rectangular-shaped areas composed of a cast-in-place concrete and metal composite structural deck, extruded polystyrene insulation, and a sloped reinforced concrete topping slab that surrounds the array of custom tubular skylights that was previously covered with a polyester resin-based liquid roof system. The nonskylight roof areas that are adjacent to the
